MANAGER'S NOTES:

DANNY GREAVES

I would like to welcome everybody back to the 'Nest' for tonight's game against Highworth.

Highworth are coming here in very good form sitting 5th in the league, and will provide a very tough test. Last year we came out on top in the opening game of the season in a very tough 1-0 win, and the game here was equally as challenging when we played out a 1-1 draw. They come here on the back of a 2-1 FA Trophy win against the much fancied Winchester, and prior to that they travelled away and beat our neighbours Melksham, and have also beat our other friends down the road in Paulton in recent weeks, so they will be in

confident mood.

We, on the other hand come into tonight with our form being a bit of a mixed bag. As I said in the Totton preview, we haven't started the way we would have liked. Small spells in each game were we step up the levels, usually preceded by below par performances for the standards the group have set and demand from each other. We had a great week on the training ground last week, with no midweek game for the first time in a while, and it was great to work on some things, tweak a few elements and give the boys a few reminders which are always needed through the season.

On Saturday I wanted to see improved performance levels over and above the result, and it's fair to say we got

that. When we perform and play the way we can, we are a match for any team. I have no doubt the many fans who made the journey to Totton and provided another excellent vocal following, will have noticed a marked difference compared to our recent games. The win against Totton bagged us another £3k prize money, with a guaranteed £1k in the next round, but a potential further £3,750 if we win the next round. This on top of

the FA Cup money is massive for the club during these times.

The challenge to the group is to now show some consistency, and to repeat those levels again tonight. Hopefully we will see another decent crowd and we can put on a performance for you all.

We now enter a tough run of Saturday / Tuesday games taking us into November, so this will be a crucial part of the season where you can put a fair few points on the board, or potentially fall away from the pack. I know its tough financially for everyone at this present moment, so please take advantage of the clubs double header offer and try and get down to the ground and get behind thee boys against 5th place Highworth and again on Saturday against 2nd place Cirencester.

LET'S HELP STOP The Spread of Coronavirus



Scan this QR code with your NHS COVID-19 App to check-in

As you know, from today the Government has introduced new Covid-19 regulations. As a professional football club we owe a duty of care to everyone in the ground, and must comply with the law. On behalf of the Board of Directors, this means we must bring some things to your attention.

TRACK AND TRACE:

THE NHS QR CODE: Please scan the NHS QR code, posters of which are dotted around the ground. This works with the NHS track and trace app, which you should download. This is a Government and League requirement. The club will not be taking your details, unless you are unable to use this system. If that is the case please speak to the official at the turnstile. To get started, go to Android's Google Play or Apple's App Store and search for "NHS Covid-19".

INote: unlike previous matches purchasing an online ticket will not count as completing trace and trace, please allow additional time to enter the stadium on a matchday!

THE CLUBHOUSE:

We must by law comply with the licensing regulations now in force. This means:

TABLE SERVICE ONLY: Please take a seat at a table to be served by the bar staff. You can still take your drinks outside once you have been served. Please do not put the staff in an embarrassing situation by asking to be served at the bar. You must wear a face covering in the bar, unless sat at a table.

CLOSING TIME: No drinks can be served after 10 p.m.

ENTRY AND EXIT: Please enter through the main clubhouse door, BUT, leave by the side passage door

IN THE GROUND:

RULE OF SIX: It applies in the ground!! Please be mindful, particularly on the clubhouse veranda.

If we don't not comply with the above the local authority can close the clubhouse and ground.

IN MEMORY OF KEN HUNT



The club was sad to hear this week of the passing of Ken Hunt.

On Tuesday we will hold an minutes applause of appreciation for everything Ken has done for our club. Without the hard work and dedication of Ken and others the club would not be where it is today. He will be greatly missed by all those that knew Ken.

Ken was heavily involved with the Club both on and off the pitch in the 1990s and 2000s and during that time he was involved in the gradual rebirth of the club in the early to mid-2000s.

In the summer of 1994, under the new chairmanship of Gordon Smith, Ken became vice-chairman for the first time and soon moved into helping out on the pitch as he stepped in to assist Mike Leeson as Assistant Manager midway through the 1995/96 season.

Following the Wiltshire bosses departure he then assisted fans favourite Simon Culliford before becoming the General Manager in 1998 after the departure of 'Culli'.

He stayed in post for two years where he also spent a brief spell helping the reserve team with Tommy Gomes. A brief break from the Club after what had been a torrid few seasons, then saw him return again in 2003 as reserve team secretary and shortly after added the post of vice-chairman which he retained until he eventually left the Clubs committee.

He left in 2007 and retired from involvement in football

but still was seen at The Hill watching the Robins and looking after the changing rooms on matchdays in the couple of seasons thereafter, including the first season the club reached the Southern League.

Ken, along with his son Gary – who also spent time on the Clubs Committee, would then enjoy spending time watching other local teams play – all the time still feeding back some scouting reports of useful players to watch out for.

He liked nothing more than the changing room style banter and sense of humour which he carried on into his roles with the Committee and if you wanted to chat football with him you could have spoken for hours such was his passion for the game.

Ken was a traditional football man who loved watching and playing the game and will be sadly missed by all who knew him after leaving a real mark on Frome Town Football Club.

JAKE JACKSON

Formally a Robin, froward Jake Jackson re-joined Frome three years on from his departure after spells with both Chippenham Town and Gloucester City.

First time around, Jackson managed 40 goals in 91 appearances, form manager Danny Greaves will hope to see once more this season, stating: "I'm delighted to bring in a player with higher level league experience and a great goal scoring record."

We caught up with the number 10 this week, to discuss all things Frome.

RB: What's been the biggest football related difficulty you've faced over the last few months?

JJ: "Losing the lockdown belly for sure. Getting fit has definitely been the toughest challenge for me, because without the training and games every week it's completely self-motivated, which is hard."

What's your biggest quality as a footballer?

"I'd say it's my goals, as a forward it's obviously the thing you're judged on, so its quite good that I feel confident in my finishing ability, I guess.

"This season I'm hoping to kickstart my second spell with Frome and aim for top goal scorer, but that being said there's a lot of healthy competition with the likes of Kane in the team."

Are there any areas you could improve?

"My match fitness and sharpness isn't 100 percent still, so I'm constantly trying to improve that so in games I can pose a real threat all through the 90 minutes

"I think it's an issue a few of the lads have had and are still struggling with after so long off during lockdown, but as long as were up for it on matchday that's the main thing, and so far results have been positive."

How would you rate both Frome's and your personal start to the campaign?

"As a team we've had a really strong start to the season and we're looking to push on from that and aim for the league title we desperately crave after last season was cut short by COVID.

"On a personal level, I'm pleased with how I'm playing so far and am happy to be back scoring goals."

What football related goals do you have?

"I've always said I wanted to play conference football and was lucky enough to spend three years in the conference North and South previously.

"However, my aim now is to enjoy football as much as possible and help Frome battle for promotion, I'm happy to be a part of the team here once again."

Who is your favourite current, and all-time player and why do you idolise them as individuals?

"Currently playing it's definitely Lionel Messi, he's the GOAT and his stats prove that, his dribbling is the best ever and he's also a good leader;


it would be great to see him in the Premier League one day.

"Thierry Henry is personally my favourite all time player though, he was so clinical in front of goal and was always a threat from any position; even if he was having a quiet game I'd get excited every time he got the ball, and that's the sign of a class player."

How is the relationship between you and Danny Greaves and what do you believe the team can achieve under him this season?

"I have so much respect for both Greavsy and Simmo. Not a lot of people know this but after my spell with Gloucester I was going to hang up my boots as I'd completely lost any love for the game; but after many phone calls they managed to





persuade me to give it another go at Frome

"I'm really thankful to them as now I'm finally enjoying playing again, and with the squad we have promotion is the only target this season and I'd love to be a part of that."

How has it been joining Frome during a national lockdown, and what difficulties have you faced?

"Very frustrating as when I signed nobody knew what was happening, so it was really hard to get motivated for a season when there wasn't even a start date.

"In terms of actually joining it was odd to do everything virtually on the likes of Zoom and Skype, but everyone was in the same boat. I'm grateful we're able to train and play at the moment so long may that continue."

A message to the supporters...

"I loved my first spell at Frome a few years ago, so I'm absolutely delighted to be back.

"With your support we can get this club rising up the leagues to where it should be, the fans and the club have always been great to me, and I hope to repay that.

Max Evans was The Robins' hero as he made several important saves, including an AFC Totton spot-kick, as they won 5-4 on penalties on The South Coast securing their place in Third Round Qualifying of the Buildbase FA Vase

The Robins made a great counterattacking move on the 10th minute mark which left Jon Davies in the box with the keeper to beat, but his close-range shot was well saved by The Stags keeper.

Jon Davies scored an absolutely fantastic free kick from about 20 yards out which gave the visitors the lead on The South Coast with 15 minutes gone.

Celebrations would be shortlived for The Robins as Jack Masterton scored a similarly well-taken strike for The Stags just minutes later. It was a rather tame affair after the quick succession of goals, with neither side really getting a hold on play but both playing some decent passing football.

The game would be set alight again as Sam Teale inadvertently got a touch on Rex Mannings' shot from outside the area, which went past The Stags 'keeper.

AFC Totton would strike back quickly once again as Ryan Oatley put the ball past Max Evans with 12 minutes left on the clock.

The match would stagger its way to penalties where Evans would become The Robins hero as he saved two Totton spot-kicks, before Warren Maidment scored the winning penalty to send the visitor into the next round of the FA Trophy.

The Robins nearly got a goal back as Alex Monks drove forward but his powerful effort cannoned back off the post.

Jon Davies' 90th minute strike got The Robins back level with just a couple of minutes left on the clock

The Larks were the victors following an entertaining penalty shoot-out as Semmens was the hero for the visitors, after saving two Frome spot-kicks.

Frome Town Women travelled to Swindon Supermarine after a couple of forced weeks off to try and get back to winning ways.

The Robins matched the home side with an end to end 1st 10 minutes, forcing both keepers into regulation saves.

15 mins in Petteford tested the home keeper just inside the area with a strong shot which was pushed away for Frome's 1st corner. Petteford whipped in a dangerous cross which Underhill profited from with a nice glancing header which left Swindon's keeper no chance.

Frome's confidence grew all over the pitch and they started to dominate the play, with the 1st half coming to a close Thorner-Atkinson tried an audacious 35yard effort that saw the back peddling home keeper thank there wasn't a bit more on it.

Frome began the 2nd half full of confidence and on the front foot and it wasn't long before Christmas had Frome's 1st effort but pulled her shot slightly wide.

A sweeping move involving a great through ball by Underhill saw Christmas this time test the keeper who at full stretch pushed the ball away for a Frome corner resulting in goal 2 a carbon copy of the 1st, Underhill timing her run to perfection and glancing in another pin point cross.

With Swindon still a threat on the breakaway Frome put the game to bed with 25 mins still remaining with a nice move down the right, Petteford nicely released Thorner-Atkinson who looked as if she should of crossed from a difficult wide angle but decided to shoot and didn't disappoint with a pin point dipping shot into the far corner.

The icing on the cake came from the hard working forward Hill who received a good ball 25yards out and spotted the home keeper off her line and teased her with a perfect lob 0-4!

Swindon worked hard to the end and got their reward with the last kick of the game 1-4 final result.

A much deserved win by Frome and with excellent performances throughout the whole team player of the match was a tricky decision, with such a long list of candidates the opposing linesman was consulted and independently picked out Petteford as Frome's stand out player bossing the right hand side of midfield throughout.

Next week we're back at The Robins Nest 2pm kick off playing Swindon Supermarine again!

COVID AND FOOTBALL... WHAT'S HAPPENING?

Battered and bruised after a series of blows, this one could be fatal.

Boris Johnson recently announced that the return of supporters to football grounds will be delayed indefinitely. potentially for up to six months, and the implications for the English game are dire

The pandemic has left club finances decimated by the absence of matchday revenue, chiefly those lower down the pyramid that are more reliant on movement through the turnstiles. The plan was for fans to return to grounds at 25-33% capacity on October 1, but with coronavirus cases rising, the Prime Minister was left with little option but to push the date back.

Announcing new restrictions in the House of Commons. Mr Johnson said: "We have to acknowledge that the spread of the virus is now affecting our ability to reopen business conferences. exhibitions and large sporting events.

"I recognise the implications for our sports clubs which are the life and soul of the communities, and my right honourable friends the Chancellor and the Culture Secretary are working urgently on what we can now do to support them."

More than 100 sports organisations recently signed a letter requesting a financial support package from the government. Johnson, however, is vet to commit to anything after the arts industry was granted £1.6billion in July. Further talks were held with the Secretary of State for Digital, Culture, sports and media. Oliver Dowden, with EFL clubs standing to lose around

£200 million if stadiums remain empty throughout the winter, while the Premier League revealed in a statement that it is currently incurring losses of more than £100million per month.

It is in the National League, though. where the stakes are highest. With the league having been in hibernation for six months, October 3 was slated as their day of salvation, the day that both football and fans would return

The new restrictions, however, have torn the plans to pieces. The "elite status" that the National League applied for in June has barred clubs from hosting matches with reduced capacity crowds, as it has meant that the leagues are now governed by the same rules as the Premier League and the EFL.Clubs are at an impasse as to whether they should carry on with the season regardless, given the lack of substantial revenue outside of gate receipts. With the furlough scheme coming to an end and the government vet to issue a rescue package, the big question is how clubs will source the money to pay their players, many of whom are full-time.

The growing feeling among club chairmen and secretaries is that. without significant intervention, this will not be possible. Ken Wright, chairman of National League North's Chorley Town, told The Athletic: "We rely totally on gate receipts and sponsorship. It's getting increasingly difficult to keep our head above the water. And it can't go on indefinitely."

Insolvency has become a very real prospect and for some, it is imminent. The demise of Macclesfield Town although not entirely Covid-related, is a case in point.

Nigel Travis, the owner of League Two side Leyton Orient told Sky Sports News:"They (the government) have not been very helpful to sports at all, they are incredibly inconsistent with their approach and I think it's time for Boris Johnson to put some money behind us.

"There's a lot of clubs in League One, League Two and the nine levels of football below us. The government needs to do more. They need to step up and give football and some other sports some support.

Joey Barton, the manager of League One side Fleetwood Town, believes part of the responsibility lies with the high earners at the top of the game. "People are getting discarded and made redundant, and clubs are being closed. That is just wrong," he said. "I have been at the top of the table and I have earned loads of dough. and I didn't complain when I earned it. But when you see players earning £300,000, £400,000, £500,000 a week and we have got clubs here that are struggling to keep the electricity on, clubs that are struggling to pay and have enough players to complete fixtures, it is just wrong. We have to protect the game from itself."

It's a sentiment shared by many in the game at the moment - the government themselves appeared to single out the Premier League as an organisation that should be doing more to help out the rest of the industry. There is, after all, a case to say the league is partly responsible. Wage inflation at the top of the game inevitably trickles its way down, and now, in this time of crisis, the clubs with disproportionate levels of income are feeling the full effects.

The Premier League has incurred no shortage of losses either but, unlike the clubs lower down the pyramid, its teams can depend upon alternative revenue streams. Matchday revenue constituted just 5% of Burnley's total income in 2018-19 but provides around 90% of the money for National League sides, leaving a chasm in their finances. It's an interesting point, and whether the Premier League actually has enough spare "wealth" to distribute is another debate

The inertia, as Ken Wright said, "can't go on indefinitely".

Highworth Town football club was formed in 1893. They joined the Cirencester & District league and it took us some time to record their first honours, unitl 1909-10 in fact, when they won both the Swindon junior cup and the local advertiser cup, a cup they captured it again in 1912-13.

After winning the Cirencester & District league divison two championship in 1931-32. They moved to the Swindon & District league, where they completed The third division championship and swindon junior cup double in 1933-34.

The 1950s saw them make a dramatic rise through the local football ranks. They won the Swindon & District league third division title again in 1954-55 and then the Division Two title the following season

One more season wasneeded to clinch the division one title and also the wilts junior cup. They then went on to win the premier division title in 1957-58, along with the Faringdon thursday memorial cup and the following season they were the Premeir division champions again, also winning the advertiser cup.

Highworth continued to dominate the Swindon & District Premier Divison in the 1960S, winning four successive titles from 1960-61 and another hat-trick. From 1965-66 to 1967-68, making seven titles in eight seasons. They reached the final of the wilts senior cup for the first time

in 1962-63 and won it thefollowing season.

There was a switch to the Wilts Combination
League, where wefinished as Runners-up in
divison two in 1970-71.

1972-73 saw another wilts senior cup victory and all this success prompted us to join the hellenic league.

Highworth achieved our first honours in 1988-89, winning the first division challenge

cup and reached the final of the wilts senior cup yet again.

They finally achieved premier divison status in 1993-94 gaining promotion after finishing third in division one. Since then Highworth have been winners of the Wilts Senior Cup in 1995-96, 1997-98, 2008-09 and again in 2014-15, winners of the Hellenic Challenge Cup in 2011-12, winners of the Hellenic Supplementary Cup.

In 1998-99 and runners up in 2003-04, runners-up in the premier division in 1999-00 And winners of the premeirship title in 2004-05.

In more recent history, which reached the semi-final of the fa vase in 2014-15.

Where they were knocked out by eventual winners north shields in a closely fought two-legged tie. This season also saw them pick up the wilts senior cup.

In the 2016-17 and 2017-18 seasons we were runners-up in the wilts senior Cup to swindon supermarine and chippenham town respectivly, both of Which played at higher levels than us.

Also in the 2017-18 season we saw promotion to the southern league Division 1 south as we finsihed as the best third placed team across the Whole country. This means we are now playing the highest level of football The club has seen.

LAST TIME WE MET AT HOME SOUTHERN LEAGUE SEPT 2019 FROME TOWN 1 HIGHWORTH 1

Frome Town and Highworth Town played out a tough contest at Badgers Hill with both sides left thinking what could have been. The game hinged on a few key chances where shots underhit or off target that could have seen the Robins pick up all three points.

The match started at fast pace with some flowing moves from the Robins, with Matt Smith and Dan Cottle making headway down the left hand side of pitch. But Highworth did well to block and intercept many passages of play, thwarting Frome to very few goalscoring opportunities in the opening exchanges.

The chances start to come and from a high press. Cottle's closing down found Hailston in the box, who held the ball up beautifully showing great strength. Hailston teed up Smith who blazed the ball high over the bar from 12 yards out.

Most of the crowd were being entertained by a great battle between Mark Cooper and Corey King, both went in hard with two separate challenges. The referee had to speak to both of them to warn them that any more would be a booking.

Then on 20 minutes the deadlock was broken. Dan Cottle intercepted the ball on the right on the edge of Highworths box. The ball found Hailston on the penalty spot. Hailston held up the ball until Smith on the edge of the area looking to strike. Smith fed Mannings who left foot curls into the bottom left corner.

In the nature of this match Highworth looked to fight back. Quickly getting the ball into Frome's area, then after a pinball-style mele, three Frome defenders were on hand to block the shot. Moments later a mistake by O'Loughlin, saw Pryce break forward. Teale slide in perfectly to scoop the ball away with a piece of fantastic defending.

Another breakaway saw Cottle, Hailston combine in the box to force the keeper to make a smart save at the near post. Then in the 44th minute Rob Brown stopped Highworth's first shot on target in a comfortable manner.

The second half turned into a cagey affair with the game becoming longer and more direct passing from both teams. The introduction of Ryan Bath started to cause problems, with Frome coming forwards more often now and the crowd are now in good voice.

However the crowd were silence by a deep cross from the left that found Morrison free in the penalty area, his header hit the right post and nestled into the back of the net.

The match started to get stretched with both sides nervous about conceding, however it was Frome that showed the final enthusiasm to seek out a winner in the last few minutes. A curled effort over the bar by Ryan Bath showed signs off promise. Then Mannings swung in a cross found Hobbs whose shot rolled wide of the post as additional time came and went.

IF YOU KNOW YOUR HISTORY...

Frome Town, known at the Robins, were formed in 1904 and played in the Wiltshire Premier League. Early success came in the form of three Somerset Senior League Championships in between 1906 and 1911, whilst in between the Wiltshire League Championship was won in 1909-10.

The Club reached the Fifth Qualifying Round of the FA Cup in 1911-12 under the old format of the competition, which was today's equivalent of the Third Round proper losing 4-1 at Southport Central, in front of a crowd of 3.366.

Frome entered the Western League in 1919 and immediately became Division 2 Champions while the Somerset FA Senior Cup was won in successive seasons 1932-22 & 1933-34 & for a third time in 1950-51.

Frome have always played at Badgers Hill and the ground held its biggest gate in 1954 when 8,000 spectators saw Leyton Orient win 3-0 in the FA Cup First Round Proper. In the same season promotion was gained to Division One of the Western League & were beaten finalists in the inaugural Western League Cup.

Promotion was gained back into the Western League after a spell in the Wiltshire League again in 1962-63 where the club remained until 2009. Success was gained in the Somerset Premier Cup in 1966-67 with victory over Yeovil

Town in the final and the cup was shared by the same two teams in 1968-69.

Frome's greatest triumph came in 1978-79 when the club won the Western League.
The Championship was secured by losing only once in the last 32 matches.
The League Cup followed in 1979-80.

Another vintage year followed in 1982-83 with victories in both the Somerset FA Premier Cup and the Western League Cup, plus runners-up in the league.

Following those heady days, Frome flirted all too often with relegation from the Premier Division, and were relegated in 1995-96 and the Club spent several years in the lower reaches of the First Division.

The Club was re-structured off the field in 1999-00 but despite the ground being upgraded unfortunately success on the field did not follow with a re-structure of the league saving the Club from relegation into County football.

Frome improved rapidly and after finishing third continued upwards as they won promotion back to the Western League

to the Western League Premier Division after a six year absence the following year & also reached the final of the league cup.

With Frome struggling to win at home during the 2003/04 season the Club turned to the help of a local "White Witch", Titania Hardie. This move brought huge media interest from all over the World. It worked immediately and they went on a magnificent run that saw them go on to finish 3rd in the league.

The 2004-05 season saw the Club celebrate their centenary & events on the field saw the Robins reach the Quarter-Finals of the FA Vase before eventually losing 3-0 at Jarrow Roofing.

A seventh, third and fourth placed finish saw the club continually improving and then runners-up spot in 2008-09 secured promotion into the Southern League for the first time in the Clubs history. The Somerset Premier Cup was also secured with a 3-1 win over local rivals Paulton Rovers.

After a poor start to life in the Southern League and a quick change of manager Frome went on an incredible unbeaten run and finished the season in sixth place and just three points from a playoff place. 12 months later and Frome beat Sholing 1-0 in the play-off final to secure promotion

to the Southern Premier Division.

The summer of 2011 also saw the Club receive the prestigious FA Charter Standard Community Club status and, in 2012, after a great first season in the Southern

Premier Division the Club were awarded the title of Community Club of the year for Somerset and then also picked up the regional award that took them into the national final.

Over the last few seasons the Robins have retained their league status while also finishing as runners-up in the Southern League Cup and the Somerset Premier Cup.

2016/17 was our most successful league season to date with the Club finishing in a respectable 8th place in the Southern League Premier division with our highest points total.

After a difficult season Frome were relegated back to Divison 1 of the Southern League at the end of the 2018/19 season. With wholesale squad changes it will be interesting to see how this season develops.
