## THE FA VASE 3RD ROUND

As we enter the last 64 teams in the competition. Here's some background on the competition and its history.

The FA Vase effectively replaced The FA Amateur Cup in 1974. In that year The FA Council had decided to abolish the official distinction between amateur and professional footballers and this meant the end of The Amateur Cup and Amateur Internationals involving England.

In its first season 220 clubs entered, but they did not include those that had dominated in The Amateur Cup. Enfield, Hendon, Dagenham, Skelmersdale United and others at their level were immediately allocated to The FA Trophy.

For the first time in history, small clubs – even village clubs – had the chance of playing in a national final at Wembley.

The first Vase finalists were Hoddesdon Town from the Spartan League and Epsom & Ewell from the Surrey Senior League. The Hertfordshire side edged home 2-1 before a crowd of 9,000.

Even a competition as democratic as The Vase had its elite clubs in the early years. Billericay Town, initially of the Essex Senior League, won it three times in four seasons. Halesowen Town, then in the West Midlands Regional League, appeared in three Finals and were successful in two. They even beat a Southall side that had a young Les Ferdinand leading the attack.

Until the new Wembley opened in 2007 the record attendance for a Vase Final was the 26,489 who saw the drawn 1989 Final between Sudbury Town and Tamworth at the old Wembley. Tamworth won the replay 3-0 at Peterborough and Ian Moores, a former Division One player with Tottenham Hotspur, scored one of the goals.

The 2013-14 Vase competition was the 40th in history. Wembley had hosted 34 Finals, Villa Park and St

Andrews two each, Upton Park and White Hart Lane one each. Thirtytwo different clubs have got their hands on The Vase, donated by former FA Councillor Frank Adams. Whitley Bay lead the way with four wins. Aficionados of The Vase competition tend to rate the 1992 Final between Wimborne Town and Guiseley as the best so far. Wessex League Wimborne had a modest record in the competition before then, having never ventured beyond the third round, but they embarked on a spectacular journey that took them all the way from the first round to the Final. A goal down after 14 minutes at Wembley, the Dorset side fought back to win 5-3.

When The Vase Final returned to Wembley, a record 36,232 fans saw Truro City beat AFC Totton 3-1. Whitley Bay, the 2002 winners, achieved a sensational hat-trick of Final victories from 2009 to 2011.

The Northern League's dominance continued for two more seasons, with success for Dunston UTS and Spennymoor Town before Sholing, then Wessex League champions, got their name engraved. North Shields then came from behind to win the first Final to go to extra time since 2001-02.

In 2015-16 Wembley Stadium staged the first Non-League Finals Day, which saw both the Vase and the Trophy decided back-to-back in front of almost 47,000 fans. Morpeth Town came from behind to stun Hereford 4-1 with 45-year-old Chris Swailes on the scoresheet to win the Vase with a third different club.

## PLAYER SPOTLIGHT: CHRIS SENIOR

Chris Senior's story is a fairly unique one, having of course played for Hamworthy before turning his hand to coaching as Tim Sills' number two, a journey that may well pave the way for his future aspirations.

"It's never been a secret that I want to go into management, with back to back long term injuries when Sills asked me to be his right-hand man it was an offer I couldn't turn down. It keeps me involved while I recover".

Having had a respectable start to the season, it's clear Senior's presence in the dressing room has had a positive effect, and undoubtedly sets the Hammers in good stead to achieve their domestic goals.



"With the talent we have in the dressing room we need to be finishing in and around the top 6. Tim and I are both winners, so would love nothing more than to get our hands on some silverware, a realistic goal seeming as we're still in many cup competitions.

"For me it's about being clinical at both ends of the pitch and that's something

we've been working on with the lads. If we can also continually improve our game management strategies, we'll be successful for long periods of time". Continuing on the path of 'long periods of time', Senior was upbeat to report on his own recovery, something that is going smoothly and will only increase the positive effect Senior has on the club upon his full recovery.

"My recovery is going well after fracturing my ankle and tearing ligaments and before then I had 7 months out with a shoulder injury, all in all rendering me unavailable for a year.

"But for now, I'm eager to continue working with Sillsy and the lads, learning from him as we push Hamworthy forward more and more. I've loved it so far and I can't wait to continue the journey".

Now with the opportunity to analyse and coach from the dugout, it was intriguing to see who Senior believed was Hamworthy's finest talent.

Of course, amid a wealth of excellence, one man just shone that little bit brighter for Senior.

"It has to be Eddie Hodge for me, he's worked really hard on his game this year and it's paid off. Now seeing him add goals and assists to his game is great to see". A foreseeable answer, given Hodge's lightning start to the campaign – however one suggestion that didn't come so fast to Senior was 'the slowest in the squad'?

"Corrr, slowest, that's a really tough one because there are a few lads... for now I'll have to say Canny, Dec and Gleese. Sorry boys".

"Fastest has to be OD I think, and he chops people for fun"!

On the subject of skills, this proves a good time to reveal Senior's dream 5-a-side team, and you have to say, it's pretty fierce. "GK: Lloris, CB: Virgil Van Dijk, LW: Ronaldo, RW: Messi and ST: Kane. That team would be unstoppable".

In truth through, Hamworthy under the tactical knowhow of Sills and Senior are doing just fine without the likes of Messi and Ronaldo. Much more important in-fact is the constant support from you, and on that end, Senior had a few final words.

The Eastleigh based visitors were in good form, and were sitting in a creditable 9th place in the table in this their inaugural season of Wessex Premier football, having been promoted as Wessex One champions last term. This was Stoneham's second visit to the Specsavers. A late rally saw United overcome the Purples

United overcome the Pu 5-2 in an early round FA Vase encounter in September 2017. With a few of the normal first team choices being unavailable, the mid-table Hammers were able to utilize their large squad, with a new signing from Poppies Louie Coulson who started on the bench.

Although the visitors were able to muster two early off target shots in an even, but uninspiring opening, it was United who broke the deadlock after 16 minutes with a very well worked goal. Ollie Davis showed great determination to keep hold of the ball as he cut in from the right. He passed the ball to the feet of Dan Cann, whose deft layback set up a superb strike by Harrison White which found the top left hand corner of the net. Chances remained few and far between, but it was Hamworthy who just edged the possession, and doubled their lead on 35 minutes. After another assist by Cann, Ash Pope weaved his way in from the left. He went past a couple of defenders before his clinical finish found the bottom far corner of the net. Another Stoneham effort finished well

heham effort finished well clear of the bar, making sure Shane Cooper had still not had to make a save before half time. The Hammers however had managed to convert their only two real chances in some style, making them favourites at this stage of the game.

Hamworthy were quickest out of the blocks after the restart. A typical low Ollie Davis cross was well snuffed out by Stoneham keeper Tom Parker-Trott. Although United continued to have the majority of the possession, they were now defending deeper, and were starting to lose their shape in midfield. They were also prone at times to giving away the ball too cheaply. The alarm bells should have started ringing on 65 minutes. Stoneham man Edu Jiminez rifled the ball onto and over the bar from distance. Had it gone in a goal would not have stood anyway due to an offside flag.

A Purples' goal however now looked ominous, and it came 5 minutes later, a classic case of deja vu for the hosts. In a Hammers' build-up from defence, a ball right across the pitch was intercepted by Mat Bainbridge. The Stoneham man fed the ball forward to Callum Laycock in space on the far right. He powered forward before tucking the ball home to the right hand side of the exposed Shane Cooper.

The Hammers should have restored their two goal cushion almost straight away. Cann almost completed a hat trick of assists when he set up a glorious opening for Pope. Unfortunately he chose to jink his way into the six yard box, and walk the ball around Parker-Trott. The keeper was now able to wrest the ball from his feet, whereas an earlier hit might have been a better option.

It was no surprise though when the visitors completed the recovery on 75 minutes. Laycock picked out Edu Jimenez whose stunning 25 yard strike clipped the bottom of the bar before going in, giving Cooper no chance to save. In fact the Purples could even have won it in the final minute.

A free kick was awarded on the right edge of the penalty area, the Assistant Referee having evidently spotted a United arm around a neck, Cooper distinguished himself by saving a point-blank header, before Declan Randall and Lee Francis bravely defended with their bodies the two follow up strikes.

Apart from four well taken goals this was a disappointing game with not a great deal of attacking football being played by either side. Stoneham can take credit for coming back from two goals down. In the last game although they lost the Hammers played well, and could and should have won both these games, but they most stop conceding poor goals.

Hamworthy's late entry into the FA Vase this year was their reward for reaching the fourth round (last 32) last season. The Oxfordshire based hosts, uncharted territory for most of the Hammers' team, were sitting in a handy fourth place in the Hellenic Leagué Division One East, one level below Hamworthy in the non-league pyramid. Chris Senior continued as acting manager, with Tim Sills still on holiday, but would have to make do without the unavailable Jamie Gleeson in defence. The lush state of the Northcourt pitch meant this fixture was never in doubt despite the continuing downpours.

The game took no time at all to come to life, with the Hammers creating the early mayhem. In the opening minute, the Abingdon stopper Jack Griffiths had to dive low to his left to keep out a Fawzi Saadi strike, before cleanly holding onto a tricky low cross by Ollie Davis. Dan Cann then had the ball in the net but was adjudged offside. However the hosts then came more into the game, forcing Ollie King into an excellent tip-over save on the quarter hour.

Midway through the half, Abingdon were awarded a controversial penalty

after what appeared to many a fair tackle by Ryan Watkins, but King somehow diverted the fierce spot kick over the bar with his legs. With both teams now creating chances, it was Hamworthy who broke the deadlock on 31 minutes. Ollie Davis sent a high ball forward into the box which eluded both the jumps of Dan Cann and a jostling defender, before hitting the hand of the backing up defender. A penalty was correctly awarded for an avoidable hand ball.

This was taken by Dann Cann himself who rammed the ball into the left corner of the net, sending the keeper the wrong way. The Hammers doubled their lead only four minutes later. Again the architect was Ollie Davis, whose cross from the left was only cleared into the path of Fawzi Saadi. The Hammers' danger man took full advantage to return the ball with interest. His superb half volley on his weaker right foot found the far right corner of the net. The visitors remained in complete control and bagged a third goal on 41 minutes. Yet another Ollie Davis cross, this time from the right, was flicked into the roof of the net by Dan Cann who pounced on the ball just ahead of the keeper. Hamworthy heaped even more misery on their

hosts with a fourth strike a minute later. Connor Cocklin jumped well to head home Saadi's well floated free kick into the top right corner of the net.

Abingdon gave themselves a glimmer of hope pulling a goal back three minutes into the restart when a menacing in-swinging cross towards the far post was forced into the net. The hosts, spurred on by their goal, upped their game for a period. However, despite winning a few free kicks in dangerous positions, the hosts were unable to take their chances, with King continuing to have an inspired game. Normal service resumed for the Hammers on 63 minutes, resulting from an excellent build up. A ball from defence was played down the right channel to Declan Randall, who in turn pushed it through to Ollie Davis. Davis beat his man before his precise square ball took out the keeper, allowing a straightforward conversion for Dan Cann, completing a well deserved hat trick. Both keepers were kept busy as chances came and went at each end, but the next goal again fell to a claret and blue shirt on 86 minutes.

Ash Pope's free kick appeared to deceive the keeper as it bent in flight, and he could only get a fist onto the ball after having to change direction. In a little spell of pin ball, both Francis and Can saw their shots charged down, before Lee Francis was finally able to force the ball over the line. This was an excellent performance and result by Hamworthy few would have predicted.

The turning point was arguably Ollie King's penalty save which, if converted, would have given the hosts confidence and something to build on. As it was, once Hamworthy opened the scoring, they remained in complete control. King was deservedly Hamworthy's man of the match, not only for a fine save at a vital time, one of many, but also for his good all round positioning, and distribution from his kicking.

## NLP: PLAYER INSURANCE IN THE SPOTLIGHT

The court ruling that has seen Ossett United ordered to pay £135,000 will have given Non-League clubs plenty of food for thought about how they approach the issue of player-to-player insurance.

The BetVictor Northern Premier League North West club have been sued by Rees Welsh, who broke his ankle in a tackle while playing for Radcliffe Borough against Ossett Town in April 2015.

Just over £19,000 in damages were awarded to the full-back, making his debut, with the club also having to pay out £115,000 in costs and legal fees.

Ossett's insurance, which included a public liability policy offered by the Northern Premier League and the minimum requirement as set out by the FA, did not cover player-to-player incidents and only covered their own legal fees should they lose a claim.

The club is now considering selling their ground in order to pay off the hefty bill.

NPL chairman Mark Harris told The NLP: "We make it clear within all the communications – and it's in the third line of the first paragraph of the communication that goes out to clubs – that it does not include player-toplayer cover.

"We will continue to recommend the policy we have for public liability and personal accident. If anything this is to remind clubs it doesn't include playerto-player." Whether the ruling will spark a wave of cases remains to be seen. It remains true that these incidents are very hard to prove, but there is no doubting it will leave much of the Non-League game very uncomfortable.

As it stands, the FA don't have playerto-player insurance as mandatory. Clubs are – or at least should be – aware of what they are covered for and that there is a potential risk of what has happened to Ossett happening to them.

Harris believes clubs don't have an appetite for that level of cover to be mandatory and the FA say their rules are reflecting what the game wants.

It is only right the authorities reflects on this case, takes the views of clubs and experts and then decides the best course of action.

Will this also put additional pressure on referees? As the sole independent party in these types of cases, a lot will be put on their reports and evidence. It is quite the position to be in.

We must also not forget about Welsh. It can't have been an easy route to go down and, however you feel about the ruling, he has suffered a major injury that will have affected not only his footballing career, but also his day-today life.

The impact of any injury to any player can't be underestimated.

#### **CLUB LEGENDS**

## ROYSTON (ROY) MITCHENER

(02-11-32 TO 27-01-1997)

#### By Roger Nicholson

Roy met the love of his life Mary at a Youth Club function in Poole in 1947. They married at St Luke's church in 1954, and went on to have a son Steven. All three have since gone on to play a huge part in the history of Hamworthy United FC. Not a great deal is known about Roy's playing career except to say that he played in some representative games within the Royal Navy whilst he was doing his National Service. He was also said to have played a few games for Bournemouth Gasworks, but for how long is not known.

We do know that Roy's playing career came to an abrupt end in the early sixties with a broken leg whilst playing in an inter-works game. I think it is fair to say that what Roy excelled at was not playing football, but refereeing it, which he did very, very well. He became a very well respected Referee within Dorset and gualified from Class 3 to Class1 (as it was known in those days) in just 1 year.


He very quickly rose up the ranks and was soon elected to the Football League line. His son Steve remembers his Dad taking him all over the southern part of England to watch him run the line at many League games. They included West Ham, Tottenham, Leyton Orient, Bristol City and Rovers, and many more. Roy was one of two linesmen who officiated at The Dell, Southampton in 1969, when England played Scotland in an Under 21 international. The other linesman was Derek Nippard (Bournemouth) who went on to referee a FA Cup Final. Two of the England Players that night were Peter Shilton and Martin Chivers.

Roy's refereeing career finished at the end of the 1972/73 season, when he handled the Dorset Senior Cup Final at the old Weymouth ground, between Parley Sports and Blandford United, a game which Parley won easily 3-0.

> As soon as Jack Cruickshank heard that Roy was retiring from refereeing he was on to him like a shot. Jack at the time was the Chairman, Manager and Secretary of Hamworthy Football Club, who had recently merged with Trinidad Old Boys FC, to become Hamworthy United.

Roy took over the role of Club Secretary a position he held with distinction for over 23years until his untimely very sudden death in 1997. For 20 years he was also a Member of the Dorset County F.A. a position which at times was not easy for Roy or HUFC. It was good when he was able to negotiate for the Hammers to have their very own Clubhouse etc. However it was not easy when he was outnumbered by fellow DCFA Members who were in favour of Poole Town taking over Hamworthy United after they were allowed to play and train on the pitch. Thankfully they were not successful. Roy of course did many other jobs as well for the Club. These included rolling the pitch (he was often seen pulling the roller behind his own vehicle,) spiking it, and also brushing the water away after rain. He also helped put the nets up, lit the boiler for the baths and all in his own time. This was usually on a Friday evening or a Saturday morning. Roy often ran the line when required to, and washed the kit afterwards: he also took his turn as a volunteer behind the Bar. He collected old newspapers to sell and raise money for the Club All this for free and for very little thanks.

It is fair to say that the Club was devastated when Roy was suddenly taken from us, but that loss was made that little bit easier when his wife Mary and son Steve decided to carry on Roy's legacy, and take a more active role in the Club. Mary for many years could be seen at every home game with first Betty Wallis and then June Manuel serving in the canteen Steve joined the Committee and is now a Director and Vice-Chairman of the Club. He was also until quite recently responsible for running the Bar and the Hundred Club. I am positive Roy would have been delighted and would have very much approved of Mary and Steve's decision to carry on his good work. Roy was, and still is missed by so many at Hamworthy Football Club.

#### FA Carlsberg Vase (1st Qualifying Round) Saturday 6th September 2014

The Hammers were looking for a good run in the FA Vase to make up for their FA Cup heartache, and hoping to accumulate some welcome prize money. Their Bristol based visitors had made a below par start in their Toolstation Western League, and were no doubt looking to lift their season too. On a warm afternoon, it was the home team who created the early chances.

They opened their account on nine minutes when Martin Warren teed up Dominic Allen whose shot was fumbled by the Bourne stopper Sam Vile, and Russell Cook was on hand to steer in the loose ball.

The visitors equalized on 33 minutes with a fine finish. Aaron Cornwall crossed to Rob Sivers who hit the ball first time on the turn to find the corner of the net from about ten yards out. The Hammers however bounced back with two more goals before the half time whistle blew, both scored by Cook. On 39 minutes, Martin Warren's swing at Alex Martin's cross fell kindly to Cook who rattled the ball into the net from close range. Cook completed has hat trick on 43 minutes with a near post flick from another Martin low cross.

The Hammers continued to show the Bourne no mercy after the restart. In the 50th minute Cook did well to outwit his defender close to the left bye-line, before laying the ball back to Tom Price who drilled it first time into the far right corner of the net giving Vile no chance. Some Hammers' fans must have started to lose count, when Cook bagged a fifth nine minutes later, firing in Ăllen's pass off the post. Jordon Cole then got in the act, with goal number six on 64 minutes, slanting the ball home after a fine run from the left. Curiously the Hammers appeared to take their foot off the gas in the latter stages of

the match. In the 77th minute the referee, perhaps a little generously, awarded the visitors a successfully converted spot kick after their busy centre forward Ashley Knights went to ground under the challenge of Jordon Cole.

The Bourne gave the score some respectability on 90 minutes with another excellent finish. Ashley McGrane volleyed high into the net from outside the penalty area, above the leaping Dan Ackerman, for Winterbourne's third goal. It is very rare that a team leaves the County Ground with three goals, yet empty handed, but this was a strange game.

Both defences looked uncannily porous at times, and that gave which ever team that had possession a decent chance of scoring. Indeed, but for some smart goalkeeping by both Ackerman and Vine, and shots just missing the target, or being cleared off the line, it could have been a rugby score.

It should also be said that Winterbourne had what looked a better bet for a penalty turned down.

The club was originally formed by Stuart Cadmore in 1988 when a group of players left the youth team Plymouth Kolts and joined the Plymouth & District League in Division 4. In that same year the club secured sponsorship from Exeter Airport, and as part of that deal they changed their name to Ex-Air Flyers. They were the first club in Plymouth to be sponsored from outside the city limits. The club colours of yellow and blue are from the colours of the airport logo and remain the same today.

In their first season the club gained promotion and then moved the Parkway Sports Club. The club carried on to be promoted in successive seasons until it reached Division one and was waiting to join the Premier Division when the Devon League was formed in 1992. The club decided to apply to become members of the Devon League instead as the Parkway Sports Club had sufficient facilities to join the league. The club was accepted but the club had to change its name so they become known as EAF Plymouth FC.

Before the 1993–94 season the Sports Club offered a number of extra facilities and help to the club, so the club changed their name to Plymouth Parkway FC. Five seasons later in 1998 the club left the Devon league to join the South Western League. On the eve of the 2000–01 season the club became homeless with the loss of the Parkway Sports Club due to a disagreement over the terms of the lease and subsequent maintenance costs. As a result, and with special permission from the league, the club spent that season having to play all of its games away from home. During their build up to the 2001/02 season the club announced they would be developing an area of Manadon as their new ground, to be known as Bolitho Park. While work was being completed, with controversial assistance from Plymouth City Council, they used The Brickfields athletics ground in Devonport, before they moved to their new and current home in August 2003.

In the 2006–07 season the club entered the FA Vase for the first time, making it to the second qualifying round in their first attempt. A season later the club became founding members of the South West Peninsula League, when the South Western Football League and the Devon County Football League merged. The club has remained in the premier division of the South West Peninsula League ever since.

In the summer of 2016, Parkway merged with Plymouth and West Devon Football League club Bar Sol Ona, whose team became the Parkway Reserves in the East Cornwall League. I
