1. DECIDE WHAT YOU WANT TO CATCH

See, I told you my tips were simple!

But this is often the reason people cruise around for hours trying to catch a fish. Any fish. They didn't decide what they want, first.

Hey, there are lots of products in a supermarket, but it's not all jumbled up in one pile. You have to look for stuff in different places, according to what you want.

The ocean isn't just a big pile of fish, either. You need to decide if you want a fighting fish, an eating fish, or a trophy fish, for example.

And then you have to go to the places where those fish are.

It sounds simple, but really, it's not easy. You need a lot of local knowledge and a deep understanding of how different species behave.

By the way, it's important for you to understand that the really big fish are a **long, long way out**.

That's why they call it offshore, or deep-sea fishing. Some charter operators don't like to spend the money on fuel, but we'll often go 20 miles or more out from the coast.

And that's why, if you're only doing a half-day charter, you should aim to catch some good eating fish. You just won't have the time to get out to the big bill fish.

2. MAKE IT GOOD FOR THE FISH

Have you ever been in sales? It's not about what you want to sell, it's about what the customer wants to buy!

Yep. Same for fishing.

That's why we don't always use a lure, we mostly use live or fresh bait. But more importantly, your "sales offer" has to be the same as the fish are feeding on at that time of the season.

What they like to eat changes by location and by season, so you have to get it right.

I mean, you don't eat the same thing all the time, either.

Then you've got to rig the bait just right, of course, and fix the spread for how you troll the bait, relative to the boat.

But you'll know when you've made a "sale" because your smile will be wide and your arms will be sore!

3. GET THE SPEED RIGHT

Whichever fish you're using for bait has a natural rhythm and speed in the water. You've got to match this, if you want to fool the fish.

Every day we check the moon, the tides and the currents and we can pretty near tell, down to within a couple of hours, when the fish are going to be biting.

But it's tricky.

For example, if you don't allow for the current, then it doesn't matter if you've got your boat speed right because, when the fish are coming up to feed, your bait isn't traveling realistically through the water.

Hey, there's plenty of experts on YouTube, ready to tell you how to go deep-sea fishing. But in this little tip-sheet I wanted to give you some tips that'll work for you on any offshore fishing charter.

However, I've got lots more to share with you, from my years as a champion tournament sport fisherman. I really hope you'll give some thought to visiting me and my team here in the north-west of Costa Rica. We call it "The Sailfish Zone" for a reason!
